CHALLENGE COST SHARE AGREEMENT Between MARIETTA COLLEGE And The USDA, FOREST SERVICE WAYNE NATIONAL FOREST

This CHALLENGE COST SHARE AGREEMENT is hereby made and entered into by and between Marietta College, hereinafter referred to as "Cooperator," and the USDA, Forest Service, Wayne National Forest hereinafter referred to as the "U.S. Forest Service," under the authority: Department of Interior and Related Agencies Appropriation Act of 1992, Pub. L. 102-154.

<u>Background</u>: The Wayne National Forest is in the process of revising its Forest Plan, which will include guidance on the administration of oil and gas activities. Marietta College is a local source of expertise on the science and policy of energy development. Marietta College is willing to partner with the U.S. Forest Service to share expertise and to facilitate engagement with public and industry stakeholders regarding the administration of energy and mineral resources in the new Forest Plan.

Title: Planning and Public Engagement Regarding Nonrenewable Energy

I. PURPOSE:

The purpose of this agreement is to document the cooperation between the parties to analyze and evaluate the best available scientific information relating to oil and gas development in and around the Wayne National Forest, and to work with stakeholders, industry, and the general public to increase understanding of land management and energy development, and to craft a strategy for addressing this issue through forest planning; in accordance with the following provisions and the hereby incorporated Operating and Financial Plan, attached as Exhibit A.

II. STATEMENT OF MUTUAL BENEFIT AND INTERESTS:

The Wayne National Forest is currently engaged in its forest plan revision process, required by the National Forest Management Act; that will result in a revised and updated Forest Plan guiding all resource management activities on the forest. As part of the revision process, the Wayne National Forest will review the availability of federally owned minerals and evaluate the plan components necessary for responsible management of energy resources on the forest. The Wayne National Forest's intent is to engage, the public,



industry, and subject matter experts in order to use the best available scientific information and develop plan components that are responsive to the concerns of stakeholders. These goals can be achieved by leveraging the expertise in science, policy, mediation, and public education that is available through Marietta College. Partnering with Marietta College will help the Wayne National Forest meet the letter and spirit of the planning rule by applying the best available science and providing broad opportunities for public and stakeholder involvement. Marietta College will provide expert consultation services on the science and engineering of energy development, facilitate meetings with the public and other stakeholders, and provide qualified student interns to help coordinate these efforts.

Marietta College is a private, undergraduate, Liberal Arts College founded in 1835. With areas of study including land and energy management, environmental science, and petroleum engineering, Marietta College hosts students and faculty with interest and expertise relating to energy development and management. With a commitment to community, service, and leadership, Marietta College is well-suited to help facilitate public engagement and education on the topic of energy and mineral resources. An emphasis on practical learning means that faculty and students could benefit by sharing expertise and participating in the Forest Service planning process. Partnering with U.S. Forest Service is also an opportunity for students to gain hands-on experience coordinating between government, industry, and the public, and applying sound principles of land management and planning.

Both the U.S. Forest Service and Marietta College are interested in public education and collaboration that leads to scientifically supported, responsible management and a better understanding of all the natural resources of Southeast Ohio. By working together the U.S. Forest Service and Marietta College are ensuring the local community is more involved with the forest planning process.

In Consideration of the above premises, the parties agree as follows:

III. COOPERATOR SHALL:

- A. <u>LEGAL AUTHORITY</u>. Cooperator shall have the legal authority to enter into this agreement, and the institutional, managerial, and financial capability to ensure proper planning, management, and completion of the project, which includes funds sufficient to pay the nonfederal share of project costs, when applicable.
- B. Participate in any group assembled for the purpose of consultation and cooperation on the subject of the Wayne National Forest plan revision and the management of energy and mineral resources on the national forest. Participation would include faculty presence at group meetings.
- C. Facilitate or mediate, with trained and experienced faculty or staff, any public meetings related to the subject of energy and mineral resources and the Wayne National Forest plan revision.



- D. Supervise students in providing assistance to the Wayne National Forest plan revision efforts in the form of meeting facilitation and planning, research, and writing. This work may occur within the context of a course related to land management and/or petroleum engineering.
- E. Provide expert consultation from faculty related to the science and engineering of nonrenewable energy development in Ohio.
- F. Assist, as requested, in writing, editing, or fact-checking documents related to energy development, and produced by the Wayne National Forest during the plan revision process. This assistance may, in some cases, be provided by students under the supervision of expert faculty or staff.

IV. THE U.S. FOREST SERVICE SHALL:

A. <u>PAYMENT/REIMBURSEMENT</u>. The U.S. Forest Service shall reimburse Cooperator for the U.S. Forest Service's share of actual expenses incurred, not to exceed \$100,000.00, as shown in the Financial Plan. The U.S. Forest Service shall make payment upon receipt of Cooperator's quarterly invoice. Each invoice from Cooperator must display the total project costs for the billing period, separated by U.S. Forest Service and Cooperator share. In-kind contributions must be displayed as a separate line item and must not be included in the total project costs available for reimbursement. The final invoice must display Cooperator's full match towards the project, as shown in the financial plan, and be submitted no later than 90 days from the expiration date.

Each invoice must include, at a minimum:

- 1. Cooperator name, address, and telephone number.
- 2. Forest Service agreement number: 18-CS-11091400-022.
- 3. Invoice date.
- 4. Performance dates of the work completed (start & end).
- 5. Total invoice amount for the billing period, separated by Forest Service and Cooperator share with in-kind contributions displayed as a separate line item.
- 6. Display all costs, both cumulative and for the billing period, by separate cost element as shown on the financial plan.
- 7. Cumulative amount of Forest Service payments to date.
- 8. Statement that the invoice is a request for payment by "reimbursement."
- 9. If using SF-270, a signature is required.
- 10. Invoice Number, if applicable.

- B. Collaborate and provide guidance, advice, consultation, and co-leadership with Cooperator to ensure the successful completion of this Agreement. Such collaboration will include but is not necessarily limited to organizing and funding public meetings related to nonrenewable energy development and forest plan revision, providing opportunities for education of students and the public, and engaging with Marietta College students to provide meaningful hands-on learning opportunities in the field of land management and planning.
- C. Provide career development opportunities for students of Marietta College through professional, task-focused interaction with industry stakeholders, and land and energy management professionals throughout multiple government agencies.
- D. Provide students with education and exposure to public land management, resource planning, and regulatory compliance related to energy resources.

V. IT IS MUTUALLY UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED BY AND BETWEEN THE PARTIES THAT:

- B. ASSURANCE REGARDING FELONY CONVICTION OR TAX DELINQUENT STATUS FOR CORPORATE ENTITIES. This agreement is subject to the provisions contained in the Department of Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2012, P.L. No. 112-74, Division E, Section 433 and 434 as continued by Consolidated and Further Continuing Appropriations Act, 2013, P.L. No. 113-6, Division F, Title I, Section 1101(a)(3) regarding corporate felony convictions and corporate federal tax delinquencies. Accordingly, by entering into this agreement Cooperator acknowledges that it: 1) does not have a tax delinquency, meaning that it is not subject to any unpaid Federal tax liability that has been assessed, for which all judicial and administrative remedies have been exhausted or have lapsed, and that is not being paid in a timely manner pursuant to an agreement with the authority responsible for collecting the tax liability, and (2) has not been convicted (or had an officer or agent acting on its behalf convicted) of a felony criminal violation under any Federal law within 24 months preceding the agreement, unless a suspending and debarring official of the United States Department of Agriculture has considered suspension or debarment is not necessary to protect the interests of the Government. If Cooperator fails to comply with these provisions, the U.S. Forest Service will annul this agreement and may recover any funds Cooperator has expended in violation of sections 433 and 434.
- C. <u>NOTICES</u>. Any communications affecting the operations covered by this agreement given by the U.S. Forest Service or Cooperator are sufficient only if in writing and delivered in person, mailed, or transmitted electronically by e-mail or fax, as follows:

To the U.S. Forest Service Program Manager, at the address specified in the agreement.

To Cooperator, at the address shown in the agreement or such other address designated within the agreement.

Notices are effective when delivered in accordance with this provision, or on the effective date of the notice, whichever is later.

- D. <u>PARTICIPATION IN SIMILAR ACTIVITIES</u>. This agreement in no way restricts the U.S. Forest Service or Cooperator from participating in similar activities with other public or private agencies, organizations, and individuals.
- E. <u>ENDORSEMENT</u>. Any of Cooperator's contributions made under this agreement do not by direct reference or implication convey U.S. Forest Service endorsement of Cooperator's products or activities.
- F. <u>USE OF U.S. FOREST SERVICE INSIGNIA</u>. In order for Cooperator to use the U.S. Forest Service insignia on any published media, such as a Web page, printed publication, or audiovisual production, permission must be granted from the U.S. Forest Service's Office of Communications (Washington Office). A written request will be submitted by the U.S. Forest Service Wayne National Forest to the Office of Communications Assistant Director, Visual Information and Publishing Services prior to use of the insignia. The U.S. Forest Service Wayne National Forest will notify the Cooperator when permission is granted.
- G. NON-FEDERAL STATUS FOR COOPERATOR PARTICIPANT LIABILITY. Cooperator agree(s) that any of their employees, voluntèers, and program participants shall not be deemed to be Federal employees for any purposes including Chapter 171 of Title 28, United States Code (Federal Tort Claims Act) and Chapter 81 of Title 5, United States Code (OWCP), as Cooperator hereby willingly agree(s) to assume these responsibilities.
 - Further, Cooperator shall provide any necessary training to Cooperator's employees, volunteers, and program participants to ensure that such personnel are capable of performing tasks to be completed. Cooperator shall also supervise and direct the work of its employees, volunteers, and participants performing under this agreement.
- H. <u>MEMBERS OF U.S. CONGRESS</u>. Pursuant to 41 U.S.C. 22, no member of, or delegate to, Congress shall be admitted to any share or part of this agreement, or benefits that may arise therefrom, either directly or indirectly.
- I. <u>NONDISCRIMINATION</u>. In accordance with Federal civil rights law and U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) civil rights regulations and policies, the USDA, its Agencies, offices, and employees, and institutions participating in or administering USDA programs are prohibited from discriminating based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex, gender identity (including gender expression), sexual orientation, disability, age, marital status, family/parental status, income derived from a public assistance program, political beliefs, or reprisal or retaliation for prior civil rights activity, in any program or activity conducted or funded by USDA (not all bases apply to all programs). Remedies and complaint filing deadlines vary by program or incident.

Persons with disabilities who require alternative means of communication for program information (e.g., Braille, large print, audiotape, American Sign Language, etc.) should contact the responsible Agency or USDA's TARGET Center at (202) 720-2600 (voice and TTY) or contact USDA through the Federal Relay Service at (800) 877-8339.



Additionally, program information may be made available in languages other than English.

USDA is an equal opportunity provider, employer, and lender.

- J. <u>ELIGIBLE WORKERS</u>. Cooperator shall ensure that all employees complete the I-9 form to certify that they are eligible for lawful employment under the Immigration and Nationality Act (8 USC 1324a). Cooperator shall comply with regulations regarding certification and retention of the completed forms. These requirements also apply to any contract awarded under this agreement.
- K. SYSTEM FOR AWARD MANAGEMENT REGISTRATION REQUIREMENT (SAM). Cooperator shall maintain current information in the System for Award Management (SAM) until receipt of final payment. This requires review and update to the information at least annually after the initial registration, and more frequently if required by changes in information or agreement term(s). For purposes of this agreement, System for Award Management (SAM) means the Federal repository into which an entity must provide information required for the conduct of business as a Cooperative. Additional information about registration procedures may be found at the SAM Internet site at www.sam.gov.

L. STANDARDS FOR FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT.

1. Financial Reporting

Cooperator shall provide complete, accurate, and current financial disclosures of the project or program in accordance with any financial reporting requirements, as set forth in the financial provisions.

2. Accounting Records

Cooperator shall continuously maintain and update records identifying the source and use of funds. The records shall contain information pertaining to the agreement, authorizations, obligations, unobligated balances, assets, outlays, and income.

3. Internal Control



Cooperator shall maintain effective control over and accountability for all U.S. Forest Service funds. Cooperator shall keep effective internal controls to ensure that all United States Federal funds received are separately and properly allocated to the activities described in the award/agreement and used solely for authorized purposes.

4. Source Documentation

Cooperator shall support all accounting records with source documentation. These documentations include, but are not limited to, cancelled checks, paid bills, payrolls, contract documents. These documents must be made available to the U.S. Forest Service upon request.

M. <u>LIMITATION OF FUNDS.</u> U.S. Forest Service funds in the amount of \$100,000.00 are currently available for performance of this agreement through **December 1, 2020**. The U.S. Forest Service's ability to provide additional funding is contingent upon the availability of appropriated funds from which payment can be made. There is no legal liability on the part of the Forest Service for any payment above this amount until Cooperator receives notice of availability confirmed in a written modification by the Forest Service.

N. <u>INDIRECT COST RATES- PARTNERSHIP</u>

Indirect costs are approved for reimbursement or as a cost-share requirement and have an effective period applicable to the term of this agreement.

- 1. If the Cooperator has never received or does not currently have a negotiated indirect cost rate, they are eligible for a de minimis indirect cost rate up to 10 percent of modified total direct costs (MTDC). MTDC is defined as all salaries and wages, fringe benefits, materials and supplies, services, travel, and contracts up to the first \$25,000 of each contract.
- 2. For rates greater than 10 percent and less than 25 percent, the Cooperator shall maintain documentation to support the rate. Documentation may include, but is not limited to, accounting records, audit results, cost allocation plan, letter of indirect cost rate approval from an independent accounting firm, or other Federal agency approved rate notice applicable to agreements.
- 3. For a rate greater than 25 percent, the Forest Service may require that the Cooperator request a federally approved rate from the Cooperator's cognizant audit agency no later than 3 months after the effective date of the agreement. The Cooperator will be reimbursed for indirect costs or allowed to cost-share at the rate reflected in the agreement until the rate is formalized in the negotiated indirect cost rate (NICRA) at which time, reimbursements for prior indirect costs or cost-sharing may be subject to adjustment.
- 4. Failure to provide adequate documentation supporting the indirect cost rate, if



requested, could result in disallowed costs and repayment to the Forest Service.

- O. <u>OVERPAYMENT</u>. Any funds paid to Cooperator in excess of the amount entitled under the terms and conditions of this agreement constitute a debt to the Federal Government. The following must also be considered as a debt or debts owed by Cooperator to the U.S. Forest Service:
 - Any interest or other investment income earned on advances of agreement funds; or
 - Any royalties or other special classes of program income which, under the provisions of the agreement, are required to be returned;

If this debt is not paid according to the terms of the bill for collection issued for the overpayment, the U.S. Forest Service may reduce the debt by:

- 1. Making an administrative offset against other requests for reimbursement.
- 2. Withholding advance payments otherwise due to Cooperator.
- 3. Taking other action permitted by statute (31 U.S.C. 3716 and 7 CFR, Part 3, Subpart B).

Except as otherwise provided by law, the U.S. Forest Service may charge interest on an overdue debt.

P. <u>AGREEMENT CLOSEOUT</u>. Within 90 days after expiration or notice of termination the parties shall close out the agreement.

Any unobligated balance of cash advanced to Cooperator must be immediately refunded to the U.S. Forest Service, including any interest earned in accordance with 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart D, 200.305.

Within a maximum of 90 days following the date of expiration or termination of this agreement, all financial performance and related reports required by the terms of the agreement must be submitted to the U.S. Forest Service by Cooperator.

If this agreement is closed out without audit, the U.S. Forest Service reserves the right to disallow and recover an appropriate amount after fully considering any recommended disallowances resulting from an audit which may be conducted later.

Q. <u>PROGRAM PERFORMANCE REPORTS</u> The parties to this agreement shall monitor the performance of the agreement activities to ensure that performance goals are being achieved.

Performance reports must contain information on the following:

- A comparison of actual accomplishments to the goals established for the period. Where the output of the project can be readily expressed in numbers, a computation of the cost per unit of output, if applicable.



- Reason(s) for delay if established goals were not met.
- Additional pertinent information.

Cooperator shall submit annual performance reports to the U.S. Forest Service Program Manager. These reports are due 90 days after the reporting period. The final performance report shall be submitted either with Cooperator's final payment request, or separately, but not later than 90 days from the expiration date of the agreement.

R. RETENTION AND ACCESS REQUIREMENTS FOR RECORDS. Cooperator shall retain all records pertinent to this agreement for a period of no less than 3 years from the expiration or termination date. As used in this provision, records includes books, documents, accounting procedures and practice, and other data, regardless of the type or format. Cooperator shall provide access and the right to examine all records related to this agreement to the U.S. Forest Service Inspector General, or Comptroller General or their authorized representative. The rights of access in this section must not be limited to the required retention period but must last as long as the records are kept.

If any litigation, claim, negotiation, audit, or other action involving the records has been started before the end of the 3-year period, the records must be kept until all issues are resolved, or until the end of the regular 3-year period, whichever is later.

Records for nonexpendable property acquired in whole or in part, with Federal funds must be retained for 3 years after its final disposition.

S. <u>FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT (FOIA)</u>. Public access to agreement records must not be limited, except when such records must be kept confidential and would have been exempted from disclosure pursuant to Freedom of Information regulations (5 U.S.C. 552). Requests for research data are subject to 2 CFR 215.36.

Public access to culturally sensitive data and information of Federally-recognized Tribes may also be explicitly limited by P.L. 110-234, Title VIII Subtitle B §8106 (2009 Farm Bill).

T. TEXT MESSAGING WHILE DRIVING. In accordance with Executive Order (EO) 13513, "Federal Leadership on Reducing Text Messaging While Driving," any and all text messaging by Federal employees is banned: a) while driving a Government owned vehicle (GOV) or driving a privately owned vehicle (POV) while on official Government business; or b) using any electronic equipment supplied by the Government when driving any vehicle at any time. All cooperators, their employees, volunteers, and contractors are encouraged to adopt and enforce policies that ban text messaging when driving company owned, leased or rented vehicles, POVs or GOVs



when driving while on official Government business or when performing any work for or on behalf of the Government.

U. <u>PUBLIC NOTICES</u>. It is the U.S. Forest Service's policy to inform the public as fully as possible of its programs and activities. Cooperator is/are encouraged to give public notice of the receipt of this agreement and, from time to time, to announce progress and accomplishments. Press releases or other public notices should include a statement substantially as follows:

"Wayne National Forest of the U. S. Forest Service, Department of Agriculture, is in the process of revising its Forest Plan according to the National Forest Management Act. Partnering with local academic institutions helps the Wayne National Forest to achieve its goal of using the best available science to responsibly manage natural resources and to engage with and inform the public throughout the planning process."

Cooperator may call on the U.S. Forest Service's Office of Communication for advice regarding public notices. Cooperator is/are requested to provide copies of notices or announcements to the U.S. Forest Service Program Manager and to U.S. Forest Service's Office of Communications as far in advance of release as possible.

- V. <u>FUNDING</u>. Federal funding under this agreement is not available for reimbursement of Cooperator's purchase of equipment. Equipment is defined as having a fair market value of \$5,000 or more per unit and a useful life of over one year.
- W. <u>CONTRACT REQUIREMENTS</u>. Any contract under this agreement must be awarded following Cooperator's established procurement procedures, to ensure free and open competition, and avoid any conflict of interest (or appearance of a conflict). Cooperator must maintain cost and price analysis documentation for potential U.S. Forest Service review. Cooperator is/are encouraged to utilize small businesses, minority-owned firms, and women's business enterprises.
- X. GOVERNMENT-FURNISHED PROPERTY. Cooperator may only use U.S. Forest Service property furnished under this agreement for performing tasks assigned in this agreement. Cooperator shall not modify, cannibalize, or make alterations to U.S. Forest Service property. A separate document, Form AD-107, must be completed to document the loan of U.S. Forest Service property. The U.S. Forest Service shall retain title to all U.S. Forest Service-furnished property. Title to U.S. Forest Service property must not be affected by its incorporation into or attachment to any property not owned by the U.S. Forest Service, nor must the property become a fixture or lose its identity as personal property by being attached to any real property.

Cooperator Liability for Government Property.



- 1. Unless otherwise provided for in the agreement, Cooperator shall not be liable for loss, damage, destruction, or theft to the Government property furnished or acquired under this contract, except when any one of the following applies:
 - a. The risk is covered by insurance or Cooperator is/are otherwise reimbursed (to the extent of such insurance or reimbursement).
 - b. The loss, damage, destruction, or theft is the result of willful misconduct or lack of good faith on the part of Cooperator's managerial personnel. Cooperator's managerial personnel, in this clause, means Cooperator's directors, officers, managers, superintendents, or equivalent representatives who have supervision or direction of all or substantially all of Cooperator's business; all or substantially all of Cooperator's operation at any one plant or separate location; or a separate and complete major industrial operation.
- 2. Cooperator shall take all reasonable actions necessary to protect the Government property from further loss, damage, destruction, or theft. Cooperator shall separate the damaged and undamaged Government property, place all the affected Government property in the best possible order, and take such other action as the Property Administrator directs.
- 3. Cooperator shall do nothing to prejudice the Government's rights to recover against third parties for any loss, damage, destruction, or theft of Government property.
- 4. Upon the request of the Grants Management Specialist, Cooperator shall, at the Government's expense, furnish to the Government all reasonable assistance and cooperation, including the prosecution of suit and the execution of agreements of assignment in favor of the Government in obtaining recovery.
- Y. <u>OFFSETS, CLAIMS AND RIGHTS</u>. Any and all activities entered into or approved by this agreement will create and support afforestation/reforestation efforts within the National Forest System without generating carbon credits. The U.S. Forest Service does not make claims of permanence or any guarantees of carbon sequestration on lands reforested or afforested through partner assistance. The U.S. Forest Service will provide for long-term management of reforested and afforested lands, according to applicable Federal statute regulations and forest plans.
- Z. <u>U.S. FOREST SERVICE ACKNOWLEDGED IN PUBLICATIONS</u>, <u>AUDIOVISUALS AND ELECTRONIC MEDIA</u>. Cooperator shall acknowledge U.S. Forest Service support in any publications, audiovisuals, and electronic media developed as a result of this agreement.
- AA. <u>NONDISCRIMINATION STATEMENT PRINTED, ELECTRONIC, OR</u>
 <u>AUDIOVISUAL MATERIAL</u>. Cooperator shall include the following statement, in



full, in any printed, audiovisual material, or electronic media for public distribution developed or printed with any Federal funding.

 - 1. Temporarily withhold cash payments pending correction of the deficiency by Cooperator or more severe enforcement action by the U.S. Forest Service;
 - 2. Disallow (that is, deny both use of funds and matching credit for) all or part of the cost of the activity or action not in compliance;
 - 3. Wholly or partly suspend or terminate the current agreement for Cooperator's program;
 - 4. Withhold further awards for the program, or
 - 5. Take other remedies that may be legally available, including debarment procedures under 2 CFR Part 417.

- Any right of copyright to which Cooperator purchase(s) ownership with any Federal contributions.
- GG. PROHIBITION AGAINST INTERNAL CONFIDENTIAL AGREEMENTS: All non federal government entities working on this agreement will adhere to the below



provisions found in the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2016, Pub. L. 114-113, relating to reporting fraud, waste and abuse to authorities:
