Guest Speaker: Jann Adams, local historian. History recognizes the Marquis de Lafayette as a military general and political diplomat, but as she was doing research about his visit to Marietta, Jann Adams began to wonder what inspired or motivated Lafayette's commitment to freedom and his courageous actions. We all make decisions based upon our values and beliefs, but are we conscious of what those are? This reflection may expand our awareness.


May 25 "Memorial and Moral Injury" Guest Speaker: Stephen DiLorenzo Memorial Day is commonly understood as a time to remember the sacrifices that our service members have made in defense of the nation. Stephen DiLorenzo, an Assistant Professor of Philosophy and career Intelligence Officer in the U.S. Army, is concerned, however, that some of the dominant forms of memorializing may contribute to Moral Injury, a condition that is marked by profound guilt and symptoms that closely resemble PTSD. He will offer more constructive ways to engage in commemoration that are better aligned with our Unitarian Universalist principles.

Plants: Of course, a plant sale is not possible without plants, so now is your chance to rehome those enthusiastic extras from your gardens and house plant collections. We ask that you please leave your **labeled** plants in the church courtyard **before** 9:00 a.m. on Friday, May 30. That is when the pricing and table-arranging crew starts its work. It is best not to leave them before Thursday in case we get hot, dry weather. Also, we have found that "teasers" posted on the plant sale Facebook page

Note: we do not want to contribute to the spread of invasive species, so please: no barberry, mimosa, English ivy, miscanthus, burning bush, Bradford pear, wintercreeper, or rose of sharon.

Bake Sale: By popular demand, the accompanying bake sale is back. If you are not a plant person but have a great cookie recipe, we need you!

A procedure for getting time-sensitive estimates from B&G approved by the Board and BoTG (when needed) was established.


- Plans for the April Congregational meeting were discussed.
